When writing a will you will come across a lot of legal jargon; here are explanations of commonly used terms.

- Will. A document in which a person specifies the method to be applied in the management and distribution of the estate after death
- Codicil. This is a document which a solicitor can write and add to your will if you would like to make a change to your recorded wishes
- **Probate**. The official procedure of proving that a will is valid, which then authorises the executors to deal with the estate
- Testator / Testatrix. This is you, the person making the will
- Executor. A person chosen by you to carry out the terms of the will—generally a younger relative or friend, may also be your solicitor
- Legacy. A gift left in the will to a relative, friend or charitable organisation
- Inheritance tax. This is a tax paid to the government if your estate exceeds a certain value. Making gifts to charity in your will may reduce your inheritance tax liability
- Estate. Everything a person owns at the time of death including property, possessions and money
- Intestate. This is when a person dies without having made a will. Your estate may not be distributed as you would wish if you die intestate.




Imagine knowing that your gift helped these people to know Jesus and be transformed by His love?

Gifts of this kind, known as legacies, are absolutely vital to the future of our work. So, by including MediaServe in your will, you'll be making sure your values live on, long after you die. And wherever people are confessing Christ as their Saviour, you will be there alongside them!

In financial terms your legacy may be large or small. Either way, it will be used so that people will hear the Gospel and receive God's Living Word.

# Taking the Gospel to Jewish people

God's first task for the founders of MediaServe was to provide Jewish people with the Word of God. Your gift will help us to continue this.

Many are reading God's Word for the first time. For example, 500,000 copies of the Russian Jewish Bible (*Star of David Bible*) have been given to Russian Jewish families, primarily in the former Soviet Union.

40,000 have been given to the Jewish communities in Ethiopia and Israel. Through this ministry, Russian Jews who might never have picked up a traditional Bible are reading God's Word for themselves.

MediaServe also reaches Jewish communities in China, India, and Myanmar with *The Prophets Speak* in their own language. Communities hidden for generations are now being found and given God's promises.

#### ■ Is it essential to have a will?

It is not a legal requirement to have a will but if you don't, at the end of your life, much of your estate may be distributed in a way you would not have wanted.

### ■ What if I already have a will?

Make sure you keep it up to date. Small changes, such as leaving a gift to MediaServe, may be possible by adding a document called a codicil. We strongly recommend you consult your solicitor with regard to any codicil.

## ■ What about inheritance tax?

Most legacy gifts to MediaServe will be exempt from inheritance tax and therefore can help to reduce the tax burden on beneficiaries. Your solicitor can advise on how to make your will tax efficient.

At MediaServe we know that a legacy is not just a financial gift but a gift of trust and one that we truly value. However large or small, your gift will be used to support our work in spreading the Gospel and seeing lives transformed.

As your will is a legally binding document, it is sensible to seek professional help when making a legacy in your will, whether making a will for the first time or amending an existing one by way of a codicil. Your solicitor will be best placed to advise on the wording, taking into account your wishes.

Options for leaving a gift in your will with MediaServe:

- Wherever the need is the greatest, allowing us maximum flexibility to use your gift according to our priorities at the time. This is the most common form of leaving a gift.
- To a particular project or country you are passionate about, for example, one you have supported over the years.

There are two main ways you can leave a gift in your will to MediaServe:

- 1. A fixed amount of money known as a 'pecuniary gift'
- 2. A share of what is left of your estate once all costs are paid out, known as a 'residuary gift'




So far, we have provided 12,000,000 Bibles and tools for evangelism and discipleship... this can only happen with support like yours.
